

"MATERIAL SPLENDOR" by Rita Miglioli

Italian-born artist Rita Miglioli's art exhibit (October 2014-February 2015) takes its theme from the classical elements of earth, air, fire and water. It is called "Material Splendor" because it uses the beauty of the physical universe to reflect the continuity of the human experience. "A rock is washed by a river, sculpted by wind, or liquefied in volcanic transformation, yet retains its essence as part of the earth," she says. "The ancients tailored their understanding to the world they observed around them, and the four-element model fit the available data, long ago."

The paintings in the show, which are mostly acrylic on canvas, use bold colors and abstract forms to illustrate the elemental subject matter. A group of eight smaller paintings highlights the show's theme, depicting the four elements in splendid colors, where even the earthen browns are enlivened with sparkling streaks of gold and silver running through the deep-toned backgrounds.



Miglioli believes that the continuity of the universe encompasses all the events, great and small, which make up our lives.

In fact, she asserts that our linear vision of life, in which one thing follows another, is itself a human construct. "Measured time is a tool we have created to organize events, slicing up the continuum to make it seem manageable." In this continuity of consciousness, she feels, there is hope for a kind of immortality. "Of course we do not live forever," she says. "But each person's consciousness is a part of the whole, and with this knowledge we can accept loss, change, creation and destruction."



Rita Miglioli is also exhibiting at Art San Diego 2014 in Balboa Park November 6-9. Her work will be shown at Milan Contemporary, a project for Expo Milano 2015. Her solo show at the Artifact contemporary art gallery in New York opens in December 2015. Her work has also been exhibited at a solo show in Ravenna, and the Museum of Art in Chianciano (Tuscany), Italy.

Alain Cohen, who curated the art exhibit, commented at

Miglioli's "Opening": "In the same way others turn to treatises, Rita Miglioli is at heart a philosopher who uses the medium of painting to think things through. In this current work, her reflection bears upon specks of the earthly universe, splendidly amplified upon her canvas in their ever-morphing materiality. She creates the vortex that she fears, and to which she abandons herself, at the same time as she tries to master it. She deconstructs the act of painting, along with the canvas that supports it. The four elements of pre-Socratic thinkers are evoked yet reconfigured by art – or is it by chemistry's periodic tables? She decants the process of consciousness and explores elements of self and herself involved in such a process. The result of this decontrolled drip painting and exhaustive self-questioning is Miglioli's large, spectacular work. It is equally distributed in appearances of nano-elements and bigbang galaxies – while other major abstract artists (such as Pollock, Twombly or Frankenthaller) are invoked in layering artwork."



Oceanids-Sounding Board

Thursday, December 4th 11:30 AM Michael Provence, Ph.D. Associate Professor and Director, Middle East Programs Department of History—UC San Diego

"The Middle East Today and in the Recent Past"

Michael Provence teaches Middle East history. He received his Ph.D. from the University of Chicago in 2001. Provence was recently an Alexander von Humboldt fellow at the Zentrum Moderner Orient in Berlin, Germany. He is the current director of UCSD Middle East Programs.

His research focuses on the colonial and post-colonial Arab world, particularly popular insurgency and nationalism between the World Wars.

Provence's current project is a history of Arab East in the period of direct colonial rule between 1920 and 1950. The project views the period by understanding the rebellions in each of the new colonial states as part of a unified regional movement. The work explores both the shared Ottoman past of the region and the shared experience of colonial military occupation and martial law.

He lived and studied over the course of many years in several Middle Eastern countries, particularly Syria and Lebanon between 1998 and 2006. He returns as often as possible.

Sounding Board is a series of seven lectures during the academic year, the first Thursday at 12 noon, sponsored by UC San Diego Oceanids and the UC San Diego Faculty Club. Oceanids, faculty and friends meet at the UCSD Faculty Club in a specially designated room to eat lunch and listen to fascinating speakers. Lunch is \$14.00 for guests and \$10.00 for Faculty Club members (purchase required). Coffee and iced tea are provided in the meeting room. A parking permit can be obtained at the front desk. 
